All calves eliminated from Harrisburg competition will then be sold at public auction beginning at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

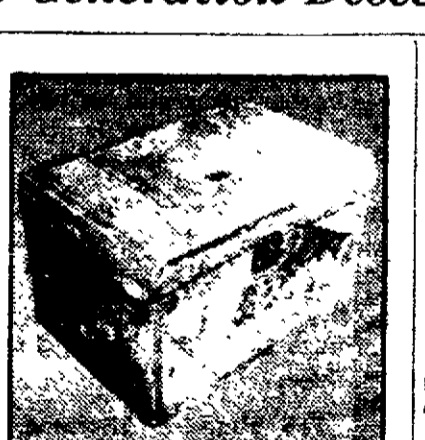
Eighteen students of Gettysburg high school, members of the editorial and business staffs of the Maroon and White, school publication, will attend the high school press conference in East Berlin today.

Old Horsehide Trunk, Once Owned by Peter Little, Founder of Littlestown, Now Owned by 6th Generation Descendant, Walter Crapster, Taneytown

In an attic, matchless for cleanliness, of a small brick home on Baltimore street, Taneytown, is an old wooden trunk, whose horsehide cover is badly torn, showing signs of long, hard wear.



Martin Hauser took out warrants in 1741 and 1743 and afterward assigned them to Peter Little to whom a patent for 311 acres was granted by the Penns on September 18, 1760.

The trunk itself is not the least bit attractive and its pecuniary worth is not to be compared with the sentimental value to its present owners.
