The Rev. A. R. Longanecker has tendered his resignation as pastor of St. John's Lutheran church, Littlestown, effective August 1. The resignation, which has been presented to the church council, was announced at the church service Sunday morning.

Upon the Rev. Mr. Longanecker's retirement, they will occupy a newly-built home at Oak Ridge, Gettysburg.

The Rev. Mr. Longanecker has served St. John's congregation for ten years and two months. He has spent 45 years in the Christian ministry. During his pastorate the parsonage on West King street, Littlestown, was entirely remodeled, the social and dining hall, equipped with a modern kitchen, was built, the Sunday school chapel was erected and new lighting fixtures were placed in the church auditorium.

The Rev. and Mrs. Longanecker have been active not only in affairs of their own church but in all activities for the betterment of the town and community. The Rev. FIRE DESTROYS NEWBARN, CROPS AND LIVE STOCK
Lightning Struck Barn on Same Site Last Fall
Damage estimated at between \$6,000 and \$8,000 was done when fire of undetermined origin destroyed a large new bank barn and damaged several fruit packing sheds at Oakwood farms, five miles northwest of York Springs just beyond the Adams-Cumberland county line Monday evening.

The fire was discovered about 10:30 o'clock by neighbors who crossed a field to rouse Adam Bream who occupies the tenant house and is employed on the farm.

Three spray outfits, two horses and two mules, 300 bushels of barley, 200 bushels of corn and 20 tons of newly harvested hay were lost in the blaze.

A threshing rig stored in the barn was the only piece of machinery to be saved.

The York Springs, Hampton and Mt. Holly Springs fire companies responded to the alarm. All were able to use a small amount of water from a number of spray reservoirs. Booster tanks were used by each company.

Only Sheds Saved
Upon the arrival of the York Springs company, which was the first on the scene, the barn was completely ablaze and efforts were turned to saving nearby sheds and a large building measuring about 30x70 feet which housed farm implements. The building, which was about 30 feet from the barn, caught fire along one side but the flames were quickly extinguished.

Little damage was done to the sheds which caught fire upon several occasions. The tenant house and another large storage shed back of the barn were not threatened. A small building containing gasoline and oil caught fire but it was quickly extinguished.

Work was just being completed in the barn which replaced another destroyed by fire last fall when it was struck by lightning.

Owner Ill in Rochester
The farms are owned by W. E. Grove, Chambersburg, formerly of York Springs. Mr. Grove has been confined to bed at Rochester, New York, for the last several weeks, having become ill while on a business trip to that place. A son, Stewart Grove, York Springs, was called to Rochester about a week ago but was unable to bring his father home due to the seriousness of his illness.

Russell Grove, also of York Springs, is manager of the Oakwood farms.

The loss is partly covered by insurance.

AUTO CATCHES FIRE
An automobile was damaged beyond repair when it caught fire after crashing into curbing surrounding the diamond-shaped grass plot in the square at Hampton early Wednesday morning. The operator of the car, a Lebanon man whose name was not learned, suffered a laceration on the forehead.

Children's Work Checked by Bureau
Albert H. Shettel, supervising inspector, bureau of inspection of the Department of Labor and Industry, Lancaster, said Monday he is receiving complaints concerning illegal employment of women and children in restaurants, hotels and other places where women and children are employed.

Mr. Shettel also states that his attention has also been called to children being permitted to appear on programs for public entertainment on broadcasting programs and in parks, theatres, night clubs and other places of amusement. It is reported that these children range in age from four to 12 years.

Supervisor Shettel says that all these complaints will be investigated. In some cases the local inspectors have already warned relative to employment of women and children. Prosecution has already been instituted in several cases in other parts of the state.

Thirteen Adams county boys and girls, members of 4-H baby beef or pig feeding clubs, were listed Saturday for further training in livestock judging preparatory to the selection of a county team to be entered in state-wide competition during State Club Week at State College next month.
